A warm welcome for all Women's Competition clubs, teams, and representatives.

As we enter the end of another fantastic season, it's great to see the Women's Competition solidify the foundation of growth and support for participants of the competition. AFLVM have now implemented a wide range of opportunities to participate in Over 35's Women's Football, particularly those players who have never played football before or were not offered the opportunity to play via traditional football pathway programs.

The Board supports the ongoing efforts of clubs and volunteers to progress the inclusion of over 35s women. This includes creating clear pathways for coaches, umpires, and administrators, all key roles where women are still under-represented at all levels of the game.

In Victoria, non-contact games were introduced in 2022 by the players, and in May 2023, the AFLVM non-contact game rules were formally approved. These rules focus on fun and encourage over 35s Women to play in smaller sides, with more chances to kick goals.

AFLVM's Over 35's Women's Competition offers traditional 18 a side football. In 2023, just the fifth year of competition, we have enjoyed some of the best footy yet. Reigning premiers Port Melbourne Colts have secured the minor premiership, but the finals are still to be decided on today's matches.

Congratulations to all competitors and thank you to the clubs, administrators, volunteers and officials who have made this season such a success on and off the field.


Mordialloc






As our hardworking coaches and team managers know very well, it is a fine balance between good recruitment and selection headaches. With injuries, holidays, family commitments, and everyone wanting a game in front of friends and family, just how many O35's players are needed to get 18 plus a bench for the season?

In 2023, our teams were made up of between 27-36 players per club. Northside had the longest list, and Williamstown had the highest availabilities with an average of 23 listed players each week. On the skinny side were Box Hill North, Darebin and Mordialloc Peninsula who had a season average of 19-20 players per week.

In the strength and conditioning stakes, Port Melbourne Colts, Mordialloc Peninsula and Parkside Spurs managing 60% of their listed players to 7 or more of the 9 matches played so far.

Nationwide, a record smashing 240 women participated in the National Carnival (Adelaide 2022), and currently 325 are registered for the 2023 Sunshine Coast Carnival in October!

The inclusion of the inaugural non contact division is an

exciting addition to the Women's fixture, with Qld and VicM fielding teams.

But wait! It doesn't stop there. We have already completed 6 QuickKick clinics across Vic Metro and are looking to run a heap more towards the end of the season as an introduction for those wanting to learn the skills of footy before signing up to the 2024 season. Stay tuned for more info!
